CNZ AGM Workshops 11 October 2015

Workshop: Seniornet

The morning started off with Grant Sidaway of Seniornet. It was Grant's idea to start a service to keep seniors learning about technology. His talk was informative about the changes technology has seen as well as useful tips to keep savvy. One that was a hit with the delegates was a simple device for remembering your passwords. If you are like me, I have scores of them and it is always a challenge to either remember them or keep them safe. Grant suggested that you have a base word that starts off all your passwords. It must be something that isn't obvious and easy for you to remember. Next you add 3 digits at the end such as a number, symbol or capital letter. Then you only have to write the last 3 digits. For example, if my base word was croquet, I would add NBS1 to the end for my password for my NBS account. It's simple and makes life easier.

Grant ended with a wonderful quote that summarized his talk: "Participate in the age in which you live!" He was encouraging all of us to not leave technology to the grandkids but to learn and use the technology that is part of us today. This was clearly articulated with his review of the technology changes of the past that are now a part of our everyday living—like computers!

Seniornet is a valuable community resource. If people within your club haven't learned how to use technology, they have a place to go.

Workshop: Strategy Session

I would like to first of all applaud the delegates for their thoughtful and creative ideas that gave all of us insights into what we collectively see as the future of croquet. For 2 ½ hours the delegates dreamed and strategized about what they wanted croquet to be. The full report, which is attached to *Croquet Matters*, contains the ideas that were generated by the delegates. These will be taken to the Executive to use as a basis for making decisions regarding croquet. A few highlights are below.

There were four questions posed to the delegates, who discussed them with their respective associations prior to the AGM. They are:

- 1. Focus on what we want to be as a sport if all our wishes and dreams could come true, what would croquet look like throughout the country?
- 2. What are we currently doing that supports collective and agreed upon dreams?
- 3. What roles do clubs, associations and CNZ have in making this happen?
- 4. What are our priorities?

The themes that emerged from looking into future activities were:

- Governance training
- Membership and participation to be increased
- Publicity
- Diversify within the club.

The next activity identified what is currently happening or needs to happen at the club, association and CNZ levels. The roles at each level were also specified. The recommendations for CNZ clearly pointed to building more infrastructure to support clubs and associations. These recommendations will be on the next Executive agenda and reporting of them will be done in *Croquet Matters* as well as other communications with associations and clubs.

A break through that is appreciated by CNZ was the delegates support of flexibility of communication to the clubs. Historically communication is through the associations. When there are urgent decisions to be made, the clubs will be contacted directly along with the associations to facilitate quicker responses.

The last discussion focussed on what CNZ is giving the associations, clubs and members. Nine items were offered. I hope that all of you will share these with your members.

Eight ideas for next year's AGM were suggested. I would like to keep that suggestion "box" open for additional ideas. We do have limited time and using it in the most effective way will be essential.

To fully answer the questions posed would take more than one session. The intention was to make a start and hopefully the delegates will take their thoughts and knowledge back to their associations for further discussion. The Executive will be discussing the information generated and resources will be identified to support priorities.

If we are going to continue to grow croquet, we must be clear about what we have, what we need, and what our priorities are. We have built a solid foundation because of all the work the members do for croquet. Like our homes, we keep a check on how strong the structure and infrastructure are. When something needs an uplift, we take care of it before it becomes a problem. If you have a beautiful home that you love, it is important to take good care of it. For me, croquet is my home and I definitely want to keep it strong.

I would like to thank Murray Goldfinch, Councillor, for working with me to present this workshop. Murray is a great asset to our Executive and I value his input and ideas. The workshop was a result of our working collaboratively.

Please take 5 minutes to read the full script from the workshop that is attached to Croquet Matters. If you have questions, please ask your delegate to talk about it. I am also open to anyone who would like to discuss it.

I also would like to visit as many associations and clubs as possible during my tenure as President. I'm working on how to schedule this because I want to play, participate in my club, and help in my region. My hope is to attend as many CNZ tournaments as possible this year. I also want to come to your association tournaments. I want to hear from you. Your voices are important.

The CNZ Gold & Silver Stars

New Zealand's most prestigious Golf Croquet handicap singles event, the Gold & Silver Stars will be an event that every GC player in the country can play in – at your own club!

Based on the AC equivalent Arthur Ross Memorial, GC players can enter their Gold & Silver Stars club competition with winners progressing to Association and National competitions to determine the national titles. As a handicap singles event, this truly is an event for all players – from the social 'never played in anything' club member to the most seasoned international campaigner.

The CNZ Tournament Committee has confirmed the continuance of the GC handicap trial for this event to establish competition that encouraged participation at all levels, particularly those that play within their own club but have never ventured beyond their club draw, or are unable to travel to enter in CNZ events. With a majority of club players now playing GC, it is important that an accessible event, such as the Arthur Ross for AC, is available to the GC croquet community.

Golf Croquet Tips for Handicap games

Playing of a handicap of -6 last season, Chris Clarke won the National Finals of the CNZ Gold & Silver Stars competition. Chris outlines some tactics that will give everyone else a better chance of beating him this year...

- Get your ball to the hoop first every time you run a hoop, think about taking an extra turn immediately to get down to the next one. And if you're not in front of it, think about taking another extra turn to get in front of it. This includes at hoop 1!
- 2. Look to take extra turns to be first to your hoop at odd-numbered hoops because, e.g. you can run hoop 1 up to hoop 2, hoop 3 down to hoop 4, etc.
- 3. Consider taking extra turns to get into the jaws of hoops but be careful you don't run the hoop! so it's safer to do this if you're coming in from an angle. But don't take them if your opponent can jump hoops and is in good position to do this.
- 4. Only **ever** use an extra turn to clear your opponent if:
 - (1) Your partner ball is in front of the hoop, or
 - (2) You can get sufficiently close to play a 20-yard stop-clearance to stay in front the latter being generally out of the ability range of most players
- 5. Be prepared to let your opponent win a hoop particularly those even-numbered hoops keep your extra turns for **you** to win hoops. If you just use them to knock your

opponent away what will happen? - your opponent will just come back in front of the hoop - wasted extra turn.

If you really need a golden role for using extra turns, don't use them to clear the opponent - it's a good starter. If you want to use them, check point 4 and only ever use them to clear if you can satisfy one of the reasons in point 4 above. Otherwise keep them in your pocket and wait for a better opportunity!

This is the first Trans Tasman Series to be played in Golf Croquet.

• Sun 22 Nov: GC Handicap Singles



I wish you could have been with us on a wonderfully sunny afternoon in the middle of October. The residents of the Dianna Isaac Retirement Village were invited to try their hand at playing on their half size croquet lawn.

Even though there were five of us there to act as Guides, five was far too few; over fifty residents turned out to watch and to play! Clearly any hope of carefully structured coaching was out of the question, so we just got those who were able bodied to hit a ball back and forth between pairs. Everyone seemed to find it fun, and a few wanted more, wanted in fact to play a "proper" game.

So four were selected and played a game of golf croquet, with coaches in close attendance. The offside rule was ignored, as were the occasional faults, and it went well until the third and fourth hoops because that side of the lawn was where the rest of the fifty were still hitting balls back and forth. However with all the good humour around, everyone survived.

Michelle, one of the village's Activity Coordinators, said she was delighted to see so many being active, but quite understood how overwhelmed the coaches had been. So she said she would try to arrange, for the next few weeks, further coaching sessions on several days a week for a different eight residents at a time.

After that it is hoped many of the residents will be able to help others to understand and play the game, and by then the coaches will also have introduced the more basic Rules. A further report may be expected in a month or two.

The "Guides" were Noeline Wiseman, Mary Dudson, and Val & Ross Harris, all four from the Edgeware Club in Christchurch, which kindly lent many mallets and boxes of balls to supplement those the Village had already bought; and Geoffrey Naylor.


