CNZ Tournament Roundup 6th WCF Women's World GC Tournament



A View from the Boundary

The sixth Women's World GC Tournament, now held approximately every four years, took place in Hawke's Bay at the start of this month. 56 players and officials were welcomed by Heretaunga Croquet Club during a wonderful opening ceremony. With a backdrop of Te Mata Peak and a relaxed and friendly atmosphere, it was a lovely setting. During the tournament, Marewa Croquet Club also proved to be a great venue with equally good hospitality.

The eight days were long and intense (and not just from the sun!). Let's not forget the heavy rain on a couple of days either. Even though players might have only had two best of three games in a day, they probably would not have originally factored in waiting for a six-hour game to finish or players spending one hour on a single hoop – these were new experiences for many.

As the block stages unfolded, the strength of the Egyptians across the group became quickly apparent. For all our players, however, whether they had previously taken part in this event or not, this was a wonderful opportunity to play matches not only against those from Egypt, but also Australia, USA, England, Scotland, Ireland, and Spain. As the days progressed, the team spirit was really evident with great support of each other's matches. Live commentary from the Clarkes, Jenny online and Chris at the side of the lawn, enhanced the experience and gave lucky spectators the opportunity to learn more whilst listening to Chris share his wealth of knowledge.

Seven Kiwis made it through to the knockout, but come the semi-finals, Jenny was the only one remaining, as well as the only competitor from the rest of the world. 'Gallant Clarke' — as described by NZ Herald - could not prevent the sixth edition turning into an all-Egyptian final affair, despite having 'thrown the kitchen sink' at the challenge. Jenny found herself two matches down before clawing her way back to level at 2-2, eventually losing 3-2 (3-7, 4-7, 7-6, 7-4, 6-7) to Soha Mostafa from Cairo. Down to the 13th hole of the fifth game — the tension was extreme for the enthusiastic group of spectators.

The final also proved worthy of the large number of croquet supporters, who witnessed a high-quality match with marvellous shots from both players. The by now hot favourite, Soha, realised her dream by winning in four games against her compatriot Manal Khoudeir 7-1 5-7 7-3 7-4.

Meanwhile, in the days after the block play, there was evident pride that our players were representing their country and all continued to give 100%, whichever section they were then playing in. Not only did Jenny finish fourth overall; but Dallas Cooke won the Shield; Ellie Ross was runner-up in the Bowl; and Phyllis Young won the Plate.

To aspiring future champs, Soha Mostafa started playing aged 15. During her first women's world champs in 2005, she finished in 16th place in the plate section. In both 2011 and 2014 world champs she failed to make the knockout playoffs and now eventually has won the tournament aged 29 years.

A big thank you must go to the managers, referees, and very many helpers for their time and commitment both before and during the tournament – it was a great success. This was witnessed by the presence of The Crowd Goes Wild TV programme, who latched on to Janine McHardy from Australia splitting a ball into three whilst taking a shot, and local photographers with daily newspaper reports. But it was much more than this - it was all akin to a worldwide croquet family coming together, with an abiding memory of the final hugs, handshakes, laughter and smiles, group photos, swapping of email addresses, new Facebook friendships and a promise to meet again. As the delightful Nicola from Ireland said to the merry multi-national group gathered at the local coffee shop shortly after the event:- 'Let's now aim for the World Women's AC – see you back in NZ next year'.

Women's World GC Championships Qualifying Tournament

This tournament was held on 30th and 31st January at Rangatira club in Dannevirke. 17 players (11 from NZ, 6 from Australia) competed for the 5 qualifying places at the Women's World GC Championships in Hawkes Bay. The weather was hot (the Australians were commenting on it as well as the Kiwis!) and lawns were fairly fast.

The number of entries and qualifying places was an awkward combination for a good format. We started with block play in 2 blocks, 1 of 9 and 1 of 8 (so two fewer rounds for Block B). The top 2 in each block qualified for the Worlds. They were offered the opportunity to play semi-finals and final plus 3rd/4th playoff; however, two players declined so there was only a final. The next 3 in each block played a further block to determine the 5th qualifier and positions 6-10 in case there were further withdrawals from the Worlds. The remaining 7 players played each other for as many rounds as they wanted.

Qualifiers for the Women's World Championships were Jenny Clarke (Canterbury) and Anne Woodhouse (Australia), the block winners, Geraldine Trivett (Australia) and Nuran Melksham (Australia), the block runners-up, and Marion Taylor (Auckland), winner of the 5th to 10th block.

The places in the 5th to 10th block were only decided in the final round. Leila Martin was 6th and next in line but only after count-back from Lynette Grant, with whom she tied on wins and net points; Vanessa Hanna was only one net point behind.
