Semifinal comeback left door open for Hogan to march on

isborne's Joe Hogan has worn back to back New Zealand men's croquet titles. He beat Croquet New Zealand chief executive Stefan Horrer, of Masterton, 26-0, 15-26, 26-2 in the final of the association croquet radional men's championship in Damnevirke on Sunday.

It was Hogan's sixth men's title.
Barry Memorial Croquet Club
member Hogan, 66, now turns his
attention to the President's Top 8
invitational event in Weillington next
month. The country's top association
croquet players will gather to
compete from March 12 to 16.

On Saturday, Hogan "came back from the dead" in his semifinal against John Versey, of Napier's Marewa Croquet Chib, to win 26-24 after being 24-10 down.

Versey went on to win the third/ fourth playoff with the other beaten semifinalist, Dennis Bulloch, of Palmerston North.

Bulloch had been the only player to beat Hogan in block play, and advanced to the semifinal as block runner-up. Horrer beat him 26-24.

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Bulloch was the beaten finalist last year when Hogan won his fifth New Zealand men's title, 33 years after winning his fourth.

Two blocks of six players contested the preliminary rounds. The winner of one block played the numer-up of the other in the semifinals.

Hogan, the 1989 world singles champion, said the best-of-three final against Horrer was played in 'extremely challenging' conditions.

"Points were not secured straight way," he said.
